To you wonderful folks of First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) of Findlay

"This year, I will make and keep my New Year's resolutions." Does that sound familiar? Do we tend to say that on January 1 and then within a week's time, realize that we are not keeping our New Year's resolutions? Or am I the only one for whom that is true?

Well, this year, as 2015 begins, I ask that you consider making a New Year's resolution that might just stick and which is a question to ask yourself: *Who am I, really, as a Christian?* The answer, of course, is that each of us is a child of God, called by God, one who has a purpose which is part of God's greater Purpose, and one who is meant to be a servant. But it can take the whole year to unpack the meaning of that for our life!

One way to unpack the meaning of all of that for our life is to increase our understanding of why Jesus came to earth (i.e., the Incarnation that we have just celebrated at Christmas) and why He died. Oswald Chambers reminds us that if sympathy is all that human beings need, then the Cross of Jesus Christ is an absurdity and there is absolutely no need for it. What the world needs is not "a little bit of love", but major surgery. Let's consider John 12:32: And I, if I am lifted up...will draw all peoples to Myself.

When we find ourselves this year face to face with someone who is spiritually lost, let us remind ourselves of Jesus Christ on the cross. If that person can get to God any other way, then the Cross of Christ is unnecessary. If we think we are helping lost people merely with our sympathy and understanding, Oswald Chambers further reminds us that we are a traitor to Jesus Christ. We need to have a right-standing relationship with Jesus Christ ourselves, and pour our lives out in helping others in His way – not in a human way that ig-

<u>nores</u> God. The theme of many of the world's religions today is to serve people in a pleasant, non-confrontational way.

But our priority this year (and every year!) needs to be to present Jesus Christ crucified – to lift Him up all the time (1 Corinthians 2:2). Every belief that is not firmly rooted in the Cross of Jesus Christ will lead people astray. If we ourselves believe in Jesus Christ and are trusting in the reality of redemption, our words will then be compelling to others. What is extremely important is for our own simple relationship with Jesus Christ to be strong and growing. Our usefulness to God depends on that, and that alone.

The calling of a New Testament worker for God (and that includes all of us!) is to expose sin and to reveal Jesus Christ as Savior. As a consequence, God does not always want us to be charming and friendly and people-pleasing (as nice and necessary as those things sometimes can be). But rather, for the most part, God expects and wants us to be serious to accomplish major faith surgery. We are sent by God to lift up Jesus Christ, not to give beautiful speeches or to make people feel good. But rather, God calls us to be willing to examine others as deeply as God has examined us. Moreover, we need to be sharply intent on sensing those scriptural passages that will drive the truth home for folks, and then not be afraid to apply them.

Are you <u>in</u>? Are you willing to give that New Year's resolution a concerted effort? Will you commit to doing that in 2015, and will you commit to helping your fellow Christian travelers here at First Christian Church, Findlay, to do the <u>same</u> this year?

Can You Hear Me Now?

In the past God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets at many times and in various ways, but in these last days God has spoken to us by God's Son. appointed heir of all things, and through whom God made the universe." - Hebrews 1: 1-2

......I'll be the first to admit that I have little patience with people who do not return my phone calls... or my texts... or my emails. I'd just as soon delete them from my contacts and spend my time calling people who want to talk to me.

But thank God, I'm not God. All of human history is an attempt, at God's initiative, to enter into a dialogue of covenantal relationship with humanity. The biblical record is replete with the records of countless attempts by God to dialogue with us in our searching, in our desperation, and even in our despair.

But our lines have been busy with vain pursuits. Our ears have been shut by the clamor of hectic lives. We've been too preoccupied with the pursuit of personal agendas to answer or return or even pay attention to God's call.

The records in the Bible tell us that even when God sent the prophets as messengers to engage us, we ignored them, rejected them and killed more than a few of them.

You'd think all that would be enough for God to completely cut off all communication with us and leave us to languish in the empty splendor of our self-centeredness.

But just when we'd expect God to scrap the covenant with humanity and cease all efforts to reconcile with us, God cleared God's voice and spoke a Word of Everlasting Love that has been resounding around the world for over 2000 years now . . . and still counting.

In these last days, God has spoken to us, not by messenger or prophet or epistle. God has wrapped God's Word up in flesh and blood and placed that Living Word in a lowly manger to give everyone easy access to God's Voice.

At Christmas (and all year long), God is still speaking. And after so many attempts, I hear God saying...
"Can you hear me now?"

Gracious God, today you have spoken emphatically, definitively and lovingly through your Son Jesus, the Christ. We are not too busy or too preoccupied. We hear you now. Amen.


