On Track with Pastor Jack

In August, my family and I were among the millions of people who took time out of their day to watch the solar eclipse. By many estimates, the 2017 solar eclipse was the most watched eclipse in history.

Now scientists everywhere warned the public over and over again that looking directly at the eclipse without protective eyewear would expose their eyes to harmful emissions from the sun, rays that could temporarily, if not permanently, damage their eyes.

Fortunately, protective eyewear was readily available to the public. Many libraries even made these valuable tools available free of charge. I was glad that my family and I received our protective eyewear and thus watched the spectacular eclipse while at the observatory on the campus of Bowling Green State University.

All of this begs this question: What harmful emissions are we being exposed to? The spectacle of white nationalists/supremacists marching in Charlottesville, Virginia, the on-again-off-again denunciation of this organized racial hate by our nation's leader, and racist graffiti right here in Findlay are just some of the harmful emissions that are part of our landscape.

However, I am so glad that God has given us protective eyewear that will enable us to avoid being intimidated by ignorance, and will keep us from being held hostage to hate. The protective eyewear is the gospel of Jesus Christ. Through Jesus Christ, we have vision that enables us to analyze and expose patterns and systems of hate, while resisting and dismantling them and ultimately replacing them with the love and justice values of Jesus Christ. By now we know that such work is not optional for Christians; it is essential.

No legitimate Christian group supports personal bigotry and systemic racism. However, what we also need to know is that Christian silence in the face of racism essentially gives permission for racial hate to exist. I am glad to know that First Christian Church, along with scores of other churches, understands that now is the time for the church to use its God-given protective eyewear, the gospel of Jesus Christ, in a comprehensive effort to expose and uproot racism and replace it with love and justice. We do not have to be Christian to oppose hate, but if we are Christian, we must oppose hate. We will not be silent! We will work with other Christians in putting on our protective eyewear and being proactive in spreading Christ's hateblocking love. Amen.

Therefore, pick up the full armor of God so that you can stand your ground on the evil day and after you have done everything possible to still stand. - Ephesians 6:13

If you're like me, Scripture passages about war and armor are difficult. I don't like the idea of violence. I don't want to encourage militaristic ways of looking at the world, and I especially don't want to perpetuate some idea that Christians need to arm ourselves against others. Every time I read this Scripture, though, I wrestle between these fears and something else: hope.

This is sometimes not an easy world if you try to be a person of integrity, no matter what your faith. You will withstand attacks on your conscience daily. You will be told that you should change yourself or your beliefs in order to get ahead. You will be asked to compromise on what is right with the promise that you can repair any wrongs somewhere down the line.

This is not a battle of our own choosing, but it is one from which we sometimes simply cannot steer clear. So, as I picture someone getting ready to go out into the world to start their day, someone who for whatever reason will face anger, pressure, or manipulation from others, I think about what it means to put on just enough armor to be able to walk through the arrows untouched.

So, put on the belt of truth and the breastplate of justice. Tie on your shoes of peace. Put a shield of faith out in front of you to block those arrows. Put on the helmet of your salvation. Carry a sword of the Spirit that will cut a path for you on those days that you have to forge your own way in the wilderness. You are covered in an armor that is far stronger than any that could be forged by our own hands. It's there not to harm others, but to keep you going when you need it the most.

FCC Participates in Anti-Hate Rally in Findlay

First Christian Church was visible and vocal during the "Anti Hate" rally at Riverside Park on Sunday afternoon, August 30, 2017. The gathering was organized by the Findlay Civil Rights Alliance and was designed to counter the hate-laced messages and violence from alt-right, white supremacist and neo-nazi proponents who marched in Charlottesville, VA on August 12. One nazi-influenced attendee from Northwest Ohio drove his car through a crowd of counter protesters, killing 32-year-old peace/justice activist, Heather D. Heyer, and seriously injuring several others. Several days later, racist graffiti was painted on a wall at Findlay's Riverside Park. These two occurrences led the Findlay Civil Rights Alliance to plan the rally. Speakers included Mallie Mae and Katie Finneran of the Alliance, Gabriel Wade of Toledo, Marc Washington and Jerome Gray of Findlay's Black Heritage Library and Multicultural Center, and our own Pastor Jack Sullivan, Jr. "It was my honor to represent our faith our church's mission statement while serving as speaker during the rally,' said Pastor Jack. Elders Linda Pitkin, Robin Kretzinger and Beth Reynolds represented the church as well. "Clearly there is much more that we as a church and community must do to counter the influence and actions of white supremacy, bigotry and hate with influential messages and actions rooted in love, justice and equality," said Pastor Jack." For us, Sunday afternoon was more than a moment; it was the beginning of a local movement for justice, peace and goodwill, one in which we all must participate."
